The photographs of Walter Genewein are presented and discussed in this engaging documentary. Genewein was the chief accountant for the Nazi party during World War II and documented many of the atrocities that occurred in slave labor camps. The harrowing pictures are made even more disturbing by the ghostly narration from Holocaust survivor Dr. Arnold Mostowicz, who recollects his experiences at the hands of Hitler disciples such as Genewein.

I Have Never Forgotten You: The Life & Legacy of Simon Wiesenthal (2006)

Oscar winner Nicole Kidman narrates this fascinating Tribeca Film Festival selection from documentarian Richard Trank, the story of architect turned Nazi hunter Simon Wiesenthal. After losing nearly 90 family members in the Holocaust and surviving a German death camp, Wiesenthal volunteered to help the American War Crimes Unit track down war criminals on the lam and went on to find more than 1,000.
